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**Wetlands:** An experimental cattail burn was conducted in March on North Smoky Hill flowage in an attempt to reduce the density of cattail in that impoundment. A wet period in spring and early summer caused some minor flooding and delayed plans for several flowage water level draw downs and dike repair work. As conditions dried out in July, much dike repair work was accomplished with a lot more to do, and water level manipulations were completed. The flowage vegetation is looking good and waterfowl production seems to have done well. Brush and trees are growing fast on dikes and other areas. Treatments with herbicide, cutting and burning are methods used to control this succession in selected locations.

**Grasslands:** Two prairie fields were burned in May. Prairie chicken surveys were completed in April and the Mead area population remained stable, but is still at a very low level compared to historic highs.

**Facilities:** Maintenance of facilities and equipment is a constant. Some repairs have been completed and other needs are in process. A replacement DNR fleet excavator was obtained, but it was soon discovered that it too needs extensive repair work. These issues seem to be chronic and sap time and effort away from dike maintenance needs. Plans for visitor center parking expansion are being considered.

**Miscellaneous Happenings:** Last fall Mead Technician Patrice Eyers designed aquatic invasive species information panels for waterfowl hunter education. These designs may be adopted by the state of Minnesota for use there. Over the next year the DNR is undergoing a realignment of its organizational structure. How this may affect the field operations is yet to be seen. Many retirements are occurring in DNR including the West Central District Wildlife Supervisor Kris Belling who retired in July. The annual duck banding and waterfowl surveys will be starting up in mid to late August.

# McMillan Marsh Kyle Christianson

The Marsh has been a busy place this spring and summer. An organized group of volunteers have been hard at work conducting invasive and wildlife surveys. They have also collected garbage, mowed dikes, and constructed and installed bat boxes. Thank you to all the volunteers for your efforts this field season.

Habitat work taking place this summer included a complete drawdown of Main flowage and partial drawdown's of Pool 2, Pool 6, and Reservoir. The primary reason was to compress/reduce the bottom organic layer and expose wetland plant seeds for germination. Marsh hay will continue to be cut to maintain grassland habitat. Brush control on the dikes is becoming a priority. Our dikes not only serve to hold water but also double as access/trails throughout the property. Failure of our dike infrastructure would reduce use through limited access.

Remember that the bike trail closes August 31<sup>st</sup>. Please follow the rules as the Marsh is used by many people.

Hunting seasons are fast approaching. Early Goose, Teal, and Dove all begin September 1<sup>st</sup>. For more information on hunting and trapping seasons, visit the DNR website at dnr.wi.gov.

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This spring and summer was full of exciting educational opportunities for many schools and the public as well. Spring education was another great success with the various topics from wetlands to forestry to prairie studies. New to the education this year was a visit from Janet Moore, a UWSP Graduate Assistant, who taught Columbus Catholic students about Tree Identification through drawing and sketching. "Drawing as a Learning Tool", was a very unique and interesting lesson that brought a new perspective to how to look at nature in detail.

Another new lesson that was introduced was thanks to help from Sue Hall and Gail Pucci. "Recycling Lesson" introduced students to the chemical make-

up of plastics, what the different numbers for recycling mean, and the future of plastics. This lesson was introduced with the Marathon Adventure Academy and

Marshfield's Madison Elementary 5<sup>th</sup> graders. This interesting lesson had students discovering how plastics are formed through the forced air process and the difference between monomers and polymers.

With the wonderful weather that we had this summer, some lessons were resurrected. An example of this was our Solar Ovens lesson. Marathon Adventure Academy got to try their hand at creating their own solar ovens made out of a shoe box, newspaper, and aluminum foil. The goal of this lesson was to learn about the use of solar energy, how to harness it, and see if the students were able to "cook" a ball of cookie dough and a piece of hot dog. Many did really well, and even though the cookies weren't cooked all the way, all enjoyed the gooey treat!

So with these new lessons and some resurrected old ones, the Mead's spring education is always changing introducing new lesson and topics to the various schools that come to visit.

This July had the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Little Naturalist story times. Bees, Bears, Ducklings, and Frogs were the topics for those fun Thursday mornings. All story times were well attended with numbers on the incline. 
