He is also a well-known columnist, speaker and radio personality, his syndicated column appears in over 20 newspapers and his wildlife programs are broadcast on a number of Midwest radio stations. He is a member of the North American Nature Photography Association and Canon Professional Services. Over the years, Stan has received various national and regional awards for his books and photographs.

Stan's Presentation will be from 12:30-1:30pm, with Book signing before and after.

The Big Picture, an Overview By Brian Peters-Property Supervisor

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It was something that I have not seen happen before significant rainfall in December. It caused McMillan and Mead to have flooding conditions. We are used to flooding. It happens every year in spring with snowmelt, and sometimes in summer and fall if heavy rains move in over us. But it doesn't happen in December. At least it hasn't before. There was plenty of water in the flowages and we actually had to release water from some. No major issues resulted except it delayed our ability to work on projects that require drier conditions and frozen ground. Two timber sale harvests did not happen because of the soft wet conditions in the woods. One logger ran into some difficulty with his operations during the wet period. Two other loggers were able to work on timber harvests after the ground froze later in the winter.

When the weather did turn cold enough to freeze the ground Mead staff were able to work on several dike maintenance projects. This is an ongoing workload that continually needs to be addressed. Most of our extensive dike systems were built in the 1960's and 70's so they are showing their age. This fact, along with

the yearly damage caused by tunneling animals is the main reason for recurring repair needs.

Our annual post-waterfowl season meeting was held in February. It was well attended by over 40 hunters. Mead staff, Patrice Eyers, Bill Hirt and Kyle Christianson put together the program and presented the results of the fall 2015 surveys of waterfowl numbers, hunters' harvests and opinions on rules. Thank you to the volunteers who assisted with the surveys!

The annual DNR/Conservation Congress rule hearings will be held in each county on **April 11**th. This year there is a Conservation Congress advisory question regarding repealing one of Mead's special waterfowl hunting rules. All interested persons are encouraged to attend one of the spring hearings to express their opinions and to vote on all proposed rule changes.

McMillan Marsh Matters By Kyle Christianson-Wildlife Technician

Winter came late and looks to be exiting early. Birds are coming back claiming their spot on the flooded

Marsh. Snakes are emerging due to the warm weather. I even saw some bear tracks while out working on water control structures!

Projects this past winter included an active timber sale along Karau and Frey, brushing of some upland hay acres along Mann road, and infrastructure repair of Pool 2 dike.

Spring/Summer work on the marsh to include surveys, tree removal, infrastructure repair, water management, prescribed burning, and timber sale management.
