The WI Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Mead Wildlife Conservation Education Program offers a fun and exciting way for your group to explore our natural resources while meeting state academic standards.

Our program is broken into relevant topics that utilize various lessons developed from teacher guides: Project WILD, Project WET, Flying WILD, LEAF, KEEP, and other appropriate activity guides. Lessons are tailored to fit the unique diversity found at the Mead wildlife area.

These lessons can be modified based on participant age/grade/abilities, weather conditions or to enhance a current classroom curriculum. We can also customize a topic or lesson to meet your group's specific needs. Mead Staff can present some of these lessons or topics at your site based on staff availability.

Program Fees

All of our wildlife education programs are offered to you free of charge. Our salaries, supplies, and program services are paid by the license fees that DNR collects from Wisconsin's hunters and anglers. Wonderful Wetlands

Students will explore the amazing world that lives in our waters, with dip nets in



hand. They will learn about the adaptations and interactions between these important organisms and their role in the aquatic ecosystem. By looking for the presence of these creatures, your class will be actively participating in citizen science, which will help gauge the health of the area being studied.

The Great Grasslands

Great Grasslands allows students to take a closer look at one of the endangered habitats found in Wisconsin. They will learn about some of the unique plants and wildlife that call prairies home. Their explorations will allow

them to gain a better understanding of the adaptations that help them to survive in today's world.



Forestry Fun

Forestry Fun is an introduction to the woodland habitat in which students get to interact with the different aspects of this ecosystem. Through these explorations, students will be able to describe the many ways in which animals depend on this habitat for their survival.

A Healthy Heritage

From Native Americans to Fur Traders to Loggers to present day life, our history shapes who we are. These hands on lessons take students back in time to a day in the life of our ancestors. They will also take a closer look at the important role hunting and trapping plays in the sustainable management of wildlife.

Wisconsin Mammals

Explore the exciting world of mammals as your class learns the identities of some Wisconsin native residents. Students will learn about these animals' life histories, as well as, how they have adapted to survive in a very competitive world. This program can be conducted at the Mead or right in your own classroom.

Orienteering

In today's technology based world, many students take for granted the ability to use a GPS to navigate in their world. However, what happens when you take away the batteries? Our introduction to orienteering allows students a fun opportunity to navigate in the outdoors without any electronic means.



Renewable Energy

Renewable energy is an

important part of a sustainable future. Here at the Mead, we house representations of five renewable energy systems. After discussing the differences between renewable and non-renewable resources, students get to explore the benefits of renewable energy through hands on lessons.

Birding Basics

Flitter, Flap, Fly! Birds are abundant here at the Mead. However they can be difficult to identify. Birding Basics introduces students to the art of birding through hikes and hands on activities designed around our feathered friends!

Winter Ecology

Wildlife still flourishes even though snow covers the ground. Winter Ecology reveals a new way to explore our world. While animal activities and movements are more visible, their ability to survive becomes more challenging. Students will have the opportunity to seek out these signs of life while on snowshoes!
