From the Field

The unusually wet spring and summer that we have been experiencing has hampered our efforts for flowage water level management. We have experienced multiple occasions where the Little Eau Pleine River flowed over its banks and into adjacent impoundments at both Mead and McMillan wildlife areas. When this happens we are unable to control water levels in those impoundments until the river recedes to its normal level. The wet weather also hampers our ability to work on dike repair needs. We continue to fall behind in keeping up with dike damage repair. A portion of the Mead bike trail remains closed to bikes due to the poor condition of the Berkhahn flowage dike along the river.

The prairie chicken counts this spring showed that the Mead population remains consistent with numbers since 2011. These numbers remain below the threshold needed to maintain the population for the long-term. An updated prairie chicken management plan for the entire Wisconsin population is being developed by a team of DNR biologists and researchers. This plan will analyze the current situation and recommend realistic options for the future.

Several prescribed burns were completed this spring and early summer in primarily upland grass habitat. The burns were mostly successful in setting back the growth and trees on the grassland areas. Other management techniques are also used to maintain the grassland habitat, including herbicide treatment of brush and trees, and some cutting and mowing in areas where that option exists.

A final plan for the DNR realignment of positions and workload will be announced soon. There is still uncertainty as to how heavy equipment needs will be met on the large state properties such as Mead.

Winged Wonders Event

How much honey does one bee produce? How far does a bee travel searching for flowers to pollinate? What is “pure honey”? How can you tell if the honey you bought that is labeled pure is really “pure honey”?

Is “Organic Honey” really pesticide free? Bees can travel as far as six miles. Are all the fields within that area not sprayed with some pesticide?

What color flowers do bees, butterflies and moths prefer?

Why is it difficult to keep bees alive over winter here in Wisconsin? How long do bees live? Does the Queen Bee live longer than the workers? If you attended the “Winged Wonders” event held at the Mead Education Center on Sunday, June 24th, these questions and many others were answered by Michelle Moore, owner of Oasis Bee Company, Plainfield.

When bees pollinate different plants does that result in different tasting and colored honey? Yes, it does. Honey made by pollinating mostly clover has a red tint to it while honey made by pollinating buckwheat is very dark colored. Honey from cranberry blossoms is red.



Honey also has many health benefits.

Dayton Kauth from “Moonlight Apiaries” demonstrated extracting honey from his observation hives. Everyone got a chance to see live bees in a hive and to taste the freshly extracted honey.

One lucky person won a prize for guessing the number of honeycombs in a jar. Two people were winners of the baskets that were raffled off. Crafts were enjoyed by the children who attended.

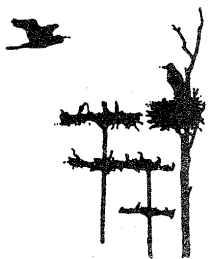

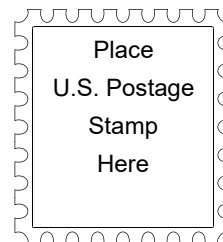
