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


BUILDERS REPORT LABOR SHORTAGES ON THE RISE

Filed in Construction Industry, Economics, Labor, Safety and Health on August 23, 2017

Labor and subcontractor shortages became even more widespread in July of 2017 than they were in June of 2016, according to single-family builders in a recent NAHB/Wells Fargo Housing Market Index (HMI) survey.

As NAHB Senior Economist Paul Emrath reported in Eye on Housing, the survey listed 15 specific occupations, and for each one, builders reported shortages of varying degrees.

Topping the list were framers and carpenters, shortages of whom were reported by roughly 3 out of 4 builders. The HMI survey also revealed a persistent shortage of subcontractors.



Save the Date! WBA Advocacy Day at the Capitol Februrary 22nd, 2018

Recently, we were able to confirm a location and date for the 2018 WBA Advocacy Day at the Capitol after reaching out to local HBAs in an attempt to avoid as many conflicts as possible. This year, the event will be held on

Thursday, February 22, 2018 at the Park Hotel on the capitol square in Madison.

We initially intended to hold the event at the Madison Club as we did in 2017, but it will be closed for major renovations in early 2018.

The format for the event will be fairly similar to last year, combining guest speakers with an issue briefing and lunch event before members go to the capitol to lobby their members of the legislature. After taking suggestions from attendees last year, the date of the event in 2018 falls on a day that the legislature may be in session which should increase the likelihood that you will be able to meet with your members of the state assembly and state senate. One other change from last year is to possibly combine the last speaker or panel with the cocktail reception, in an attempt to get members on the road headed home a littler earlier.

Finally, we are also working to confirm a location and dates for the April, July, and October WBA Member Meeting Days in 2018. The first WBA Member Meeting Day and Installation dinner will be held on Friday, January 19th, 2018 at the KI Center in Green Bay. We will be working again with local Executive Officers to avoid major conflicts on dates in 2018 and will be getting the word out on the rest of the meeting dates in 2018 when they are determined.

Foxconn Takes Wisconsin By Storm

With a now month and a half delay in passing the state budget in Wisconsin, all eyes last week were focused on an agreement to bring tech giant Foxconn to Wisconsin. This project is being described as "one of the largest greenfield investments by a foreign-based company in U.S. history, as measured by jobs. It will employ 13,000 workers with an average salary of \$53,875 plus benefits. The project will also support 10,000 construction jobs over each of the next four years as well as 6,000 indirect jobs from the construction. On top of this, there are at least 22,000 indirect and induced jobs expected to be created throughout the state."

Rumors of this announcement had been circulating for a few weeks and were finally announced in a press conference at the White House on Wednesday, July 26. After the press conference, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was then signed by Governor Scott Walker, Foxconn Founder and CEO Terry Gou, Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation CEO Mark Hogan, and Special Assistant to the Chairman of Foxconn Louis K. Woo at a ceremony at the Milwaukee Art Museum.

WBA President David Belman stated, "This will have a big impact on our industry to provide safe and affordable housing in southeastern Wisconsin. Members of the WBA are ready to help provide housing options for those that are new to the area and those that are looking for new housing options in the future."

What comes next? Governor Walker has already called a special session of the legislature to vote on legislation that includes all the economic incentives tied to job creation, and a hearing is being held on that legislation in the assembly today. Leaders in the state assembly have stated they would like this bill to be passed through their chamber by mid-August. Senator Majority Leader Scott Fitzgerald told reporters on Tuesday his house would prefer that the state budget be completed before final passage of any legislation dealing with Foxconn.

It is very likely that passage of a final incentive package will include both republicans and democrats, but it remains to be seen how many members of the legislature will cross party lines to vote for the package.

DSPS Asks for Attorney General Opinion on Validity of Multifamily Sprinkler Code, Reverting to State Statutes on Regulation

Jarchow & Tiffany Introduce "Homeowners' Bill of Rights"

Recently Representative Adam Jarchow and Senator Tom

Tiffany introduced two bills as part of their "Homeowners' Bill of Rights" package to improve property rights and to help housing affordability in Wisconsin.

At a press conference in the Assembly Parlor, the lead authors discussed two new bills that will focus on "housing affordability" and "general property rights".

The housing affordability package includes many provisions with the following highlights:

- Review of State Electrical Wiring Code: This bill moves to a six-year review for the state electrical code as it pertains to one and two family homes. Two sessions ago, legislation was passed to move the review of the one and two family building codes to a six-year cycle. This legislation is intended to have the electrical code on the same timeline as the building code for one and two family homes.
- Development Regulation: Clarifies that an application for a development permit is grandfathered from any changes to local ordinances at the time the application is submitted, even if the local government has multiple permit requirements for the development. This bill grandfathers the application for a development permit from changes to local ordinances if the application must be approved by multiple local governments, but not multiple approvals by the same local government. In doing so, the legislation makes it crystal clear that property owners, like the ones in McKee v. City of Fitchburg, will not have the rules of the game unfairly changed after they begin the development approval process.
- · Forestation State Property Tax: This provision removes the forestation state property tax, the only part of a property owners' tax bill that goes directly to the state. In an effort to keep property taxes low, this is one more step in the right direction by not only holding the line on property taxes, but reducing the property tax burden on homeowners. Property taxes are another road block for prospective homeowners and this bill helps reduce that burden.
- TID Districts for Workforce Housing / Impact Fees: Because of the high cost of regulation and costs associated with building new homes, many new homes that are being built are not affordable for working families. This proposal would reduce those costs and make building a new home within reach for working families. This bill also reduces impact fees that a city, village, or town can impose on a workforce housing development by 50%.
- · Reports on bills and rules affecting housing: Requires DOA to create a report on any proposed administrative rule that will affect the development, construction, cost, or availability

of housing in the state. This will give policy makers a clear view of the affects that regulation has on the affordability of housing and how that impacts home ownership.

Some of the highlights of the general property rights bill include:

- · Conditional Use Permits: This section creates a definition of "conditional use" and addresses the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision in AllEnergy v. Trempealeau County. Creating a definition of a conditional use provides certainty for property owners by establishing a fairer and more reasonable approval process. This bill also requires local government to grant the conditional use permit if the property owner satisfies or agrees to satisfy all conditional use permit conditions and requirements.
- Variances: Codifies current law by defining "area variance" and "use variance" and stating the burden of proving "unnecessary hardship" can be met by demonstrating that strict compliance with a zoning ordinance would unreasonably prevent the property owner from using the property owner's property for a permitted purpose or would render conformity with the zoning ordinance unnecessarily burdensome (area variance), OR leave the property owner with no reasonable use of the property in the absence of a variance (use variance).
- Private Ponds: This section exempts private ponds from any shoreland zoning regulations. A private pond is defined as a body of water that is not hydrologically connected, does not discharge into a navigable waterway, is less than five acres, has no public access, and is completely surrounded by land privately owned by the same person. Oftentimes, permitting requirements to dredge or modify a pond on one's own property can become onerous and expensive.

We look forward to working with WBA members and with the bill authors and legislators to pass these important provisions.

Gronik Announces Run for Governor


Political newcomer Andy Gronik announced recently that he would be seeking the democratic nomination to challenge Scott Walker for governor in 2018.

Gronik said on his campaign website that "It's time for a different kind of leadership in Madison. I'm not a politician. I'm a business leader with the progressive values necessary to beat Governor Scott Walker and make living in Wisconsin better for all of our residents — that's why I'm running for governor."

Other are expected to join Gronik for the right to face Walker in 2018, and being the first out of the gate has pros and cons. Gronik can now start raising campaign funds and traveling the state in an attempt to look for early support. On the downside, he will now likely be a target for the GOP to take shots at, which is exactly what happed after his announcement.

Shortly after Gronik's announcement, the Republican Party of Wisconsin issued a press release calling him an "out-of-touch con artist" and knocked him for his support of getting ride of reforms that were passed as part of Act 10.

"It's easy for an out-of-touch con artist like Andy Gronik to spout off in an interview, but the fact remains that hardworking Wisconsin taxpayers and families have already seen \$5 billion in savings as a result of the reforms in Act 10. Gronik would not only take that away, but go even further than the big government special interests who controlled Wisconsin before Governor Walker put taxpayers in charge. If Andy Gronik is going to be a serious candidate for governor, he must immediately share his plan for how he'll pay for these extreme ideas," said Alec Zimmerman, spokesman for the Republican Party of Wisconsin.

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
